Spring is Blooming!

27 & 28 September 2025 AT LINCOLN EVENT CENTRE

Spring is just around the corner and the annual Botanical Expo is being held on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th September. The expo is again being held at the Lincoln Event Centre in Meijer Drive from 1-4pm Saturday and Sunday from 10am-4pm. Admission is the same as last year \$5 with children under 16 free.

The Botanical Expo is known for its vibrant plant fair where you can find a wide variety of rare and unusual plants. Specialists will love the rare alpines, bulbs and perennials. Super stalls to buy those impossible-tofind treasures and hard-to-find gardening books.


This year the whole of Lincoln Event Centre will be filled with spring flowers, displays and demonstrations. Contributing groups include the National Daffodil Society with their annual South Island Show, New Zealand Alpine and Garden Society (NZAGS) with their annual show. There are competition entries from the Avon Floral Art in Canterbury Groups Show. The Christchurch Bonsai Society will show as well as the Canterbury Orchid Society who are participating in the expo for the first time.

The daffodils promise to be spectacular with displays of all the different colours and forms available in the world today. Most of these blooms are hybrids having been bred over the last 120 years from species daffodils found in the wild in Europe.

Special mention must be made of miniature varieties which are much smaller than the standard varieties. This section







of the show is where you will also

find examples of species daffodils.

Another section of the show to look

out for is the intermediates which are

smaller than the standard varieties but

larger than the miniatures. These blooms

are well suited for growing in containers and

smaller gardens. Other show stoppers to

look out for include the doubles and splits.

Visitors to last year's expo would have seen a stunning display of bonsai classified by their size, varying from shohin/mame (miniatures <20cm) to dai (large >60cm). This year the display will be slightly different as it will be based on the style of the tree rather than it's size. There are a number of recognised styles and there will be competition classes for Informal uprights representing trees of the plains and valleys; cascade/semi-cascade from the mountains and cliff faces; literati style, a very free-form, minimalist style; group and landscape style; as well as shohin/mame and novice classes.

Hello from the Lincoln Community and Residents' Association (LCRA).

We had this year's AGM on the 11th August at Community Care Lincoln in a large meeting room with a fairly good turnout. We are grateful for Community Care's support providing us with a monthly meeting place. I have summarised below of the notable agenda items which I have for the most part covered in previous newsletter issues.

Following the AGM we had a guest speaker presenting on the relevance and mechanics of Community Boards of which Selwyn only has one (Malvern).

John Verry from the Malvern Community
Board was excellent at articulating how they
work, their benefits as a link between the
community and the council, and the recent
Local Government Representation Review
that the council used to attempt the removal
of the Malvern Board. Fortunately that
attempt failed following the Commission's
recommendation that it be kept together with
consideration be given to accepting further
boards in the district. A rare success for local
democracy. Watch this space, there could be
more on this topic on the horizon and please,

if you have further comments to add, get them to us.

The AGM included the tabling of my report of committee activity over the recent year. Here is a summary.

- The evolution of committee itself with resignations of the Inaugural Chairperson (Vic Wadham) and the Secretary (Troy Volman) who were replaced with myself and Bex Dollary respectively.
- The committee facilitated a public meeting between Lincoln businesses and the council to discuss dissatisfaction with some aspects of the Town Centre Upgrade design. A compromise was asked for but none given. The mayor and senior council managers were invited but none attended.
- The committee submitted against the all important Water Reform proposal.
 The council managements preferred option was to create a separate Council Controlled Organisation (CCO). We submitted against along with nearly 90% of others. The council voted for the CCO.
- Work to save the Lincoln Community Newsletter. Due to a number of factors the newsletter was in danger of ceasing

to continue. We are confident this won't happen, in fact there could well be a brand new newsletter in October being distributed to all of Lincoln.

Election of the committee members

Current members nominated and re-elected: Lindsay Wilson, Tanya Douglas, Andre Strauss, Bex Dollary, Kathryn Claridge and Ralph Scott. New members nominated and elected: Neale Elder, Mark Song and Sue Prendergast.



Heritage Festival 2025: Exploring heritage landmarks on James Street

Heritage Festival 11-27 October 2025

The Heritage Festival theme this year **Building place, evolving communities**, seems especially appropriate for Lincoln and districts, and James Street the perfect heritage precinct to explore stories of our evolving community.

It was named by and for Lincoln's flamboyant founder James Edward Fitzgerald in 1862. The street was blessed right from the start with two church reserves, Church of England at the bridge crossroads, and 'Scotch' Presbyterian to the north, with settled Scots farming families Tod, Galletly, and Dunn, nearby.

Their first church opened in 1866, as did the Government School and school house. The Public Library, Fairground, Pound, and St. Stephens followed in the 1870s. By 1881 the Presbyterians required a bigger church and later a new manse (now The Old). Library use had declined by 1900 and the solution was to move the building by traction engine to the town centre. Then growing needs of the community saw larger Coronation Library (1911), built. The Lincoln Maternity Hospital opened in 1927, and with nearly a century of stories to its name it closed in 2022, maternity services now Rolleston based. The Community Garden carries on the hospital garden tradition of growing the freshest vegetables and fruit.

The original school building became the Primary Manual Centre for the district after construction of a new classroom

block in 1948. The original school was demolished in 1973 – its front step now at Liffey Cottage. School growth has continued!

In 1968 the last of Fitzgerald's sections was taken up for the Lincoln Fire Station, a fine home base for the amazing voluntary Brigade, which had been operating since 1963 from Habgoods yard. And Liffey Cottage of course, trucked down James Street in 1977 to stand on the old Library site next to the Union Church!

In the mid 1990s community led action averted the demolition of St. Stephens, and ensured its restoration, opening again in 1999.

There are several stories to be told, of demolition, and of last minute rescue, of moving buildings to a new site, the steadfast belief in the value of heritage sites, and of community led action. And yours too of life along James Street!

Liffey Cottage landscaping

Thank you for all the positive comments about the recent landscaping work at Liffey Cottage – isn't it fabulous!

We wish to acknowledge and thank the Selwyn District Council staff and the Greenlinc team for their planning and for the meticulous work at Liffey Cottage.

The Cottage now has a setting that befits its high profile site and honours its 150 year old history. Yes, 1875–2025!

Importantly, on a corner that had become a hazard, it is much safer for pedestrians, cyclists and scooter riders, and the source of wind-blown dust, so damaging to heritage items in the Cottage, has been removed.

In 1977, the picket fence from the Cottage's original location in Market Square was sold, picket by picket, for the Liffey Cottage Preservation Fund. Then, plans for restoration included a new picket fence, now nearly 60 years later, we are thrilled to see the work of the Liffey Cottage Action Committee also honoured.



TAIT Industries to the new high school science laboratories for equipment.

I am also on the Selwyn Community Patrol Committee responsible for statistics both within the patrol and reporting to the Police; recruitment which I have helped to increase by a third; and also social media.

I manage three local community Facebook pages – Lincoln Voice; Selwyn Community Patrol; and my own candidate page 'Denise Carrick – Candidate for Selwyn Council, Springs Ward.' Please do follow me to see how my campaign is going and also to see how hard I have worked over the years for our community. I am very much about getting things done – often there is too much talking and not enough action. This month, our patrollers took part in and contributed towards a record attendence at the annual Police training session which is held for all Canterbury patrols. Community Patrols have an even more important role to play than ever before so it was great to see so many volunteers attending.

The topic, *Crowded Places and Behavioural Assessment* was fascinating and outlined procedures to protect crowded places from attack. This could, for example, be in a supermarket, in a shopping mall, at a concert or at a street fair. It isn't something we want to think about but everyone should have a plan of what to do should something happen – similar to the drill we have for earthquakes.

In September, the Police will be relaunching their *Crowded Place Strategy* with the tagline "Escape, Hide, Tell". So you can say you heard it here first! Canterbury are leading the way on taking up this strategy for bigger events. The health and safety of customers, employees and children are essential at these big events where there are large crowds.

In July, our Selwyn Patrol patrolled for 84 hours and our patrols covered 845km! Recently a few patrollers have left us due to work commitments or relocating to other areas so we are on the look out for new recruits! Volunteering is a great way to meet new people and help your community. We currently have 45 active patrollers but we really need a few more especially with the growing population in Prebbleton and Lincoln.

The patrol car is based in Lincoln but we also look after Prebbleton, Tai Tapu, Springston, Leeston, and as far away as Southbridge.

All we ask is if you can commit to a single three hour patrol each month (of course, you are welcome to do more). You would need to be police vetted and then do a few training patrols. Our volunteers always patrol in pairs for safety reasons and the car has a dash cam to record your patrol. 
Over thirty pieces were exhibited in 2023 (this event is held every two years), and the judges were hugely impressed by the standard of the work.

Bokashi versus composting

Recently we held a workshop for disposing of organic waste, ie, kitchen scraps and garden waste, via the bokashi method, and by traditional composting. Dave Grantham took us through the Bokashi steps, while Errol covered the dos and don'ts of efficient composting.

Bokashi and composting are two methods for getting rid of organic waste in a useful, environmentally-friendly manner. They rely on very different processes, and result in distinctly different end products. Bokashi uses a sealed, anaerobic (ie, no-air) fermentation process, while traditional composting relies on oxygen and aerobic bacteria for success. That is why a compost heap should be turned over from time to time to provide good aeration, and not allowed to get too moist, otherwise the breakdown of the organic material takes longer to complete.

Bokashi is faster, can handle a wider range of food scraps, and produces a pre-compost material that needs further decomposition, by burying under a layer of soil. (Dave is burying his bokhashi product in a trench.) On the other hand, fully-composted material can be dug in, with immediate benefit to soil nutrition.

While bread, meat and dairy scraps should not be composted, bokashi can handle these types of waste. However, the bokashi method requires some investment in two sealed containers and special activating agent ("bokashi bran"). To save money, two recycled ten-litre paint buckets with a lid will do the job just as well – Google 'Bokashi Resene' for clear instructions.



Introducing our volunteers

This month's Community Gardens volunteer is David Brown. Says David, "I'm a born-and-bred Mainlander who moved to Lincoln a few years ago. Fellow Brown rascal, Keith Brown, introduced me to the Lincoln Community Gardens, where Ruth and Errol lead a fantastic team of regulars and visitors in creating a thriving community resource on the grounds of our old Maternity Hospital, which is nearly 100 years old.

Inspired by the work here, I'm close to completing my Horticulture Certificate through the Open Polytechnic. Mrs Brown's boys tackle many tasks, but our special project is transforming a boggy, shady, weed-ridden strip into a native plant area. Progress is slow but steady, fuelled by legendary afternoon teas and great chats.

With so much knowledge among the team, there's always someone to learn from – whether it's pruning, composting, or seasonal cropping. And the work is always varied, from gathering horse manure from a local farmer to helping a neighbour move a truck load of soil". Thank you David for your willing contribution to our community garden.

- On Saturday 27th September, Dr Sally Price with speak on the theme "Knowing your soil". We will learn about how to improve our soil's physical attributes and health, based on Sally's research for over 15 years.
- On Saturday 18th October, Roger McLenaghen and Josie Mazzetto of Lincoln University return to present the popular workshop "Don't treat your soil like dirt".

Our annual workshop **Veges 101** will be on Saturday 1st November. This basic workshop, conducted by Errol Wood and Graham Burge, is intended for people, young and old, with little or no experience in growing vegetables, but are keen to get started.

A worm-farming workshop will be presented by Ben Hogan on 8th November. More details later.

All our workshops run on-site from 10.30 to 11.30am. A koha from participants to support the Community Gardens is appreciated at these events.

124 new car parks open in Lincoln's Town Centre

A total of 124 new parking spaces will soon be open across two new car parks in Lincoln, making it easier for residents and visitors to access local shops and services in Selwyn's second-largest township.

As part of the Selwyn District Council's Lincoln Town Centre upgrade project. The new parking spaces support the town's growth and accessibility.

- North carpark

 William Street

 Genald Street

 Author Street

 South carpark

 South carpark
- South car park: Access via Gerald and Maurice Streets
- North car park: Access via Lyttelton and William Streets

Parking is free at both locations. Most spaces are restricted to 120 minutes, with some 10 minute parks closer to the shops that will be clearly marked. Bike stands will be added during stage one work later this year.

The Council's Executive Director Infrastructure and Property Tim Mason says it is fantastic to reach this milestone in the project.

Selwyn District Council Springs Ward Councillor Grant Miller says it is great to have the car parks open before stage one works start.

"We wanted to ensure that these car parks were open before stage one construction begins later this year – giving the Lincoln community and businesses time to become familiar with the new parking.

Mason adds: "Later this year, we will be starting work on stage one of the project, which includes a pedestrian plaza, planting over 50 new trees and replacing angled parking on Gerald Street with more open space to improve visibility, safety and public amenity for all road users.

"It's all part of creating a town centre that works well for drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists."

Lincoln has experienced rapid population growth, reflecting the need to upgrade the town centre, he says.

"Since 2020, Lincoln's population has increased from 8,340 to over 12,000

residents – an average growth rate of nearly 10% per year. Lincoln now makes up more than 14% of the Selwyn District's population, highlighting the need for smart infrastructure and planning to support the growing community."

Gerald Street sees about 11,000 vehicles daily, projected to rise to 16,000 by 2045. Heavy and medium commercial vehicles make up roughly 7% of this traffic, says Mason.

Stage one of the project is currently in the tender phase with construction due to start later this year after a contract is awarded

Councillor Miller adds: "The addition of 50 new trees, expanded pedestrian zones, and cyclist-friendly features are designed to foster a vibrant community space.

"Residents and visitors can look forward to a refreshed Gerald Street and improved amenities, ensuring Lincoln remains a welcoming place to live, work, and visit."




Each month Down By The Liffey Gallery features a selection of talented local artists in an exciting exhibition.


After a few months off, Death Café Lincoln returned to the Lincoln Event Centre in August. Meetings are planned for September, October and November.






