


Justine says, "Everyone is a beginner when they first start and no one should ever worry about getting everything right because that is totally and utterly unrealistic. Enjoying the music, moving and gaining better fitness is what is important. I am planning on using a similar playlist for a number of weeks in a row. This will help people understand the music and moves, and ensure they get a good workout."

Bollywood is not a single rhythm but music and songs from the Indian Film Industry. Mumbai, the home of Hindi cinema, used to be called Bombay, and so combined with 'ollywood' from 'Hollywood' became Bollywood. Today there is also Tollywood, Kollywood, Pollywood and this has spread out of India with approximately 17 different 'ollywoods' e.g. Ghana in Africa has Ghollywood and Nigeria Nollywood. Today 'Bollywood' incorporates many different rhythms from many different geographical regions within India.

Bollywood movies are famous for their huge colourful dance scenes and joyful vibe.

What's in a speech sound? What's in a word? What's in a sentence?



We all know how important speech and language development is for children from birth to 5 years (and older) to learn speech sounds, words, and sentences. The ability to express needs, wants, information, thoughts, experiences, and more is critical for a child's (and parents too) well-being, self-esteem, and confidence. Its importance can never be underestimated.

Speech and language development is precious for children's knowledge and understanding of the world and learning. By the time they walk into school for their first day, they have had 5 years of help from adults in their environment to be able to understand and use spoken language. From birth, a child requires support from adults to nurture speech and language growth. Children do not and cannot do it on their own.

Children learn through hearing and watching others talking. As young as 3 months old you can see babies watching and listening (and sometimes touching their mother's mouth while she is talking) and then trying to make speech sounds themselves. It is fantastic. The learning keeps on going. For example, a 2-yearold might copy saying their mother's comment "Nice drink". A 3-year-old might copy their grandmother saying, "Oh, that bird flew away" or "That bird has disappeared".

This means that as adults we all have a precious part to play to nurture speech and language learning for babies, toddlers, and preschoolers. It doesn't stop at a set age. It goes on. Our support gives children fun and love within our relationships with them.

Weathering the storm: protecting your trees from extreme weather

In recent years, the impact of stormy weather on trees has become increasingly evident, with events like Cyclone Gabrielle leaving a lasting mark on New Zealand's landscape. As Cyclone Gabrielle swept through the country, its fierce winds and torrential rains wreaked havoc on trees, causing widespread damage that is still having a major impact on affected communities 12 months later.

One of the most significant threats posed by stormy weather to trees is the risk of structural failure. High winds can exert tremendous force on tree limbs and trunks, leading to the snapping of branches or even uprooting of entire trees. In the case of Cyclone Gabrielle, gusts reaching speeds of over 150 kilometres per hour battered trees across the region, leaving behind a trail of destruction.

Older, diseased, or weakened trees are particularly vulnerable during storms, as they may lack the strength and resilience to withstand the onslaught of extreme weather. As Cyclone Gabrielle demonstrated, even trees that appear healthy can suffer damage under such conditions, emphasising the need for regular tree assessments and maintenance.





Storm-damaged trees can also pose significant safety hazards to people and property. Fallen branches or uprooted trees can block roads, damage vehicles or property, and even cause injury or loss of life. In the aftermath of Cyclone Gabrielle, communities across New Zealand faced the daunting task of clearing debris and assessing the extent of damage inflicted by the storm.

Arborists play a pivotal role in assessing the health and stability of trees, providing vital insights into potential risks, and recommending what actions are needed. Thorough inspections before and after storms enable

arborists to identify and address weak points in trees, such as diseased limbs or structural defects, reducing the likelihood of storm-related damage. Additionally, strategic pruning and thinning can help improve a tree's resilience to high winds by reducing its overall weight and improving its aerodynamics.





Lincoln University to support green initiatives with new Sustainability Fund

Te Whare Wānaka o Aoraki Lincoln University has announced the first round of funding from its new Sustainability Fund, sourced from a surcharge that applies to all air travel undertaken by University staff.

The first round of funding, totalling almost \$40,000, will contribute to a range of projects aiming to support more sustainable research and teaching at the University and/or reduce carbon emissions on campus.

A grant of \$15,000 has been awarded to Dr Bin Tian, senior lecturer and researcher in wine science and microbiology, for his project WineCycle, which will transform the waste product of the winemaking process into valuable garden fertiliser.

With more than 40 students enrolled in Lincoln's Viticulture and Oenology programmes annually, the University typically generates ~.5 tonnes of byproduct, known as grape marc, from winemaking. Staff and students involved in the WineCycle project will construct a composting facility for the grape marc, later distributing the compost as fertiliser around the vineyards and other horticulture activities on campus. The WineCycle project will also develop online lecture materials to support the teaching of sustainable winemaking, and will showcase the composting initiative to visiting wine industry professionals.

\$10,000 from the Sustainability Fund has been granted to a 10-person cohort of Lincoln University soil scientists to take a low-carbon path to attend the New Zealand Society of Soil Science and Soil Science Australia Joint Conference (NZSSS), to be held in Rotorua in December 2024. This year's NZSSS will bring together 200 leading and emerging soil scientists from Australia and Aotearoa to advance understanding of topics ranging from carbon sequestration to sustainable agriculture.

The Lincoln delegation, comprising a mix of academic staff and students, will travel by train from Christchurch to Picton, then on to Wellington by passenger ferry, with one night's accommodation in the Wellington Central YHA. The group will then travel by bus to Rotorua to attend the conference before undertaking the same journey in reverse to return to campus, sharing their experiences with the community along the way via social media and other channels. This low-carbon path will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions by a full 82% than if the same journey was undertaken by air travel.

A further \$8,000 from the Sustainability Fund has been granted to a group of four Lincoln University staff to create a resource guide to assist academics in embedding sustainability into all of the University's courses and programmes.



The project will review a teaching toolkit developed by University College London – Embedding Sustainability in your Teaching and Learning – which outlines strategies to embed Educational Sustainable Development (ESD) into the curricula of tertiary institutions. ESD aims to equip students with the knowledge, skills and attributes needed to work and live in a way that safeguards environmental, social and economic wellbeing for present and future generations.

The new resources developed by Quality Group will support Lincoln staff from all faculties and disciplines to incorporate ESD into Lincoln's courses and programmes.

\$3,200 has been granted to a group of Lincoln staff and students from three campus organisations – Lincoln University Students' Association (LUSA), Lincoln Environmental Sustainability Society (LESS) and Sustainability Action Group for the Environment (SAGE). The group manages and promotes Sustainability Week, a campus-wide annual event featuring a wide range of sustainability-themed activities that encourage the University community to think more proactively about their environmental impacts and to behave more sustainably in their everyday lives.

The funding for Sustainability Week 2024 will be used to host related activities, including an event to promote more sustainable transport options for the daily commute, a planting event where 400 native seedlings will be planted in Lincoln University's Arboretum, and a panel discussion focusing on the University's progress towards its emission reduction targets and achieving its sustainability goals.

\$3,555 from the Sustainability Fund will be used to purchase the Peek app – a user-friendly online tool that provides an accessible and inclusive student-centred learning environment for field trips and other excursions. Peek will support sustainability education at Lincoln through delivering interactive information to participating students about the ecological, social and cultural features of their excursion locations in and around campus and in the wider Canterbury region.

Lincoln University Vice-Chancellor, Professor Grant Edwards, is also Chair of the University's Sustainability Taskforce. He says sustainability is at the heart of the University's teaching, research and leadership.

"Lincoln is Aotearoa's only specialist land-based university, and we are deeply committed to ensuring future generations can flourish and grow. We are firm in our intent to be an exemplar of sustainable practices for the land-based sector, and the ecosystems within.

Sustainability Fund

Lincoln University's Sustainability Fund was introduced in late 2023 to support the development of campus or community-based sustainability activities.

The Fund was established to receive, accrue and allocate proceeds from a 5% sustainability surcharge, also introduced in 2023, that applies to all work-related air travel undertaken by Lincoln University staff.

The purpose of the Sustainability Fund is to enable more sustainable research and teaching practice and to support campus initiatives to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Lincoln staff and/or students can apply for grants in groups or individually to a maximum of \$20,000 per grant.

Funding applications are assessed by a Sustainability Steering Group, with funds allocated to the successful applicants twice each year.

Demolition of Burns Building

The Burns Building demolition project is progressing well, with the soft demolition now entering the soft strip demolition phase.

Soft strip demo involves removing all linings and fixings from the building, including windows, and is undertaken by manual labour with the use of some small machinery. The soft demo phase will leaving a concrete shell, ready for the hard demolition phase.

A scaffold has been installed along the northern and western sides of Burns, and has been fully scrimmed to prevent debris and dust from distributing over the boundary of the demolition site. The scaffold is the full height of the building and will be progressively removed as the building is demolished.

The contractor, Southern Demolition and Salvage Ltd, plan to demolish the Burns Building using a 38m Hitachi High-reach excavator. The high-reach will enable Southern Demolition to bring the 25.5m building down safely, with extra capacity in the machine's reach to allow greater control.

This hard demolition phase is likely to begin in late March, and is expected to take approximately 17 weeks.

Our continuing dry spell has meant that regular watering has been necessary, but this has brought the rewards of a good vegetable crop. However, the ravaging of our nashi pear and red plum trees by birds and wasps has been disappointing. Even wrapping the plum tree in netting did not deter the birds. But our "black boy" peach trees are looking promising and the harvest is almost ready. We always have a surplus of fruit so if anyone wants peaches that preserve well, please contact me first. A donation towards the community gardens would be appreciated.

Recently, Errol has given presentations on "Easy Composting" at the Lincoln and Rolleston libraries. Among the topics he covered was the concept of soil pH, which probably holds the greatest sway on what grows well in your garden. The soil pH is important because it affects the ability of the roots to absorb various important nutrients (eg, phosphorus, magnesium, molybdenum). While the pH scale ranges from 0 (very acidic to 14 (very alkaline), the pH of soils fall in a much narrower range and most plants prefer a neutral pH around 7 to thrive. However, some vegetables such as potatoes, carrots, parsley and radish prefer more acidic soils. If your soil is too acidic for other plants, applying some lime will increase its pH.

Two questions arise: (1) Should I test my soil for pH? (2) Do I need to routinely apply lime to my compost heap or soil?

The answer to both questions is, in general, no. The simple pH probes that can be purchased from garden and hardware shops are too imprecise to give useful results. If you have serious concerns about the ability of your soil to grow healthy vegetables, pay for a laboratory test.

Rarely is there a need to apply lime to your soil or compost, especially if you don't know its pH. The best strategy for all soil types is to regularly add a layer of compost to the soil surface ("mulching"). This gradually merges with the soil and brings its pH towards a neutral value close to 7. If you are really keen to grow plants that won't flourish in your soil, create the ideal conditions in a container or raised bed.

Once again, we really appreciate the support of the Ellesmere Lions Club who every year deliver a generous load of hay to the Community Gardens. The bales are well used in mulching and adding to our compost heaps. Our first event for the year, Tony Bywater's popular bonsai workshop, is already fully subscribed. But anyone who would like to participate in a future workshop by Tony can contact me. Tony is also providing a refresher workshop in April for those who have already attended his basic bonsai course.

On 13th April, Wendy Kentjens from Lincoln University will be presenting 'Fungi in your garden – friend of foe?' at Lincoln Library 10.30–11.30am.

The speaker for the March meeting at Community Care Lincoln (CCL) will be Helen Ross, Co-ordinator of the Elder Care Canterbury Network. Helen is a registered social worker with extensive experience in Older Persons Health, Mental Health and Community Development.

Elder Care Canterbury (ECC) is a collective of people representing organisations, service providers and consumers who have an interest in improving the health and well-being of older people in Canterbury.

Elder Care Canterbury is a contract that Enliven, Presbyterian Support has held with the CDHB – now Te Whatu Ora Waitaha – since 2006. Its origins date back to 1997 when it began life as a collaborative undertaking between the 'CHE's' (Crown Health Enterprises) HealthLinkSouth, Canterbury Health, and Pegasus Health in an attempt to integrate and improve health services for older people. A celebration was held to mark its 25th anniversary in late November 2022.

The network of approximately 300 members receive regular email updates on such things as events, services, training opportunities, research, and policy developments relating to older people. Regular forums have been held in Christchurch, Rangiora, Ashburton and at various locations in the Selwyn District with speakers on various topics relating to older person's issues, services and agencies. Representatives from many agencies come together through forums and focus groups. Furthermore, older people have a direct voice through an ECC Consumer Group who are individual consumers of health services, or members of advocacy organisations.

ECC enables active involvement of older people in improving their health services and exchange of information and communication between agencies and groups.

ECC identifies areas where collaboration between groups/ agencies will improve services, issues, gaps or deficiencies in health services for older people and ECC advocates for the appropriate changes for improved access to health services for older people.

ECC assists with Information about service gaps so that they are

brought to the attention of funders or service providers and also minimises duplication of services.

Helen will present an interactive session on some of the things to consider when it comes to ageing well.

"Join us at the Lincoln Community Care group on Thursday 21st March 2024, from 1pm at the Rata Wing, CCL, 16 Lyttelton Street, Lincoln," says Helen. "All are welcome to attend, whether you are living with advancing age or just thinking that some-day you might be a senior citizen."


